This year's competitive field of candidates underscores Ms. Lantto's exceptional academic standing. Her professor, Dr. Jill Murray, identified and submitted the paper to the Social Work Department for review by the selection committee. The paper originated as an assignment in Dr. Murray's research class.

This honor reflects the outstanding work being done at the university, particularly within the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work. Of all the MSW students enrolled in Louisiana's universities, only two were chosen to present their papers to an audience of professional social work providers. Such recognition significantly advances the institution's reputation as a provider of quality social work education.


SUNO ATHLETICS




SUNO FORENSIC SCIENCE PROGRAM HOSTS NET CHARTER HIGH SCHOOL

SUNO MUSEUM OF ART: LIMINAL SPACES EXHIBITION OPENING



SUNOMA proudly hosted the two-day opening of Liminal Spaces: Selections from the Edward DeCarbo African Art Collection. Inspired by conversations with the DeCarbo family, this exhibition pays homage to Dr. Edward DeCarbo's scholarly teachings, which frequently engaged with the concepts of "liminality" and "liminal spaces." These terms encapsulate the power of African art to serve as a conduit between the tangible and intangible, the traditional and modern, and the individual and collective. The exhibition not only highlighted the generous donation of African art by Dr. Edward DeCarbo and his daughter, Vanessa DeCarbo, but also commemorated the first anniversary of his passing.

The opening events began on the morning of February 17th with a thought-provoking panel discussion on the significance of African art donations at SUNOMA. The panel featured esteemed speakers Dr. Sara Hollis, Dr. William Bertrand, and Ms. Vanessa DeCarbo. Attendees were captivated by the rich discourse on the importance of African art within academic and cultural institutions. Adding to the vibrant atmosphere, the event included an electrifying performance by stilt walkers and drummers from Djembafola and RocSolid Productions, infusing the gathering with traditional African rhythms and movement.

The evening opening of the exhibition was a great success, with remarks from Chancellor James Ammons, Ms. Vanessa DeCarbo, Director Erika Witt, and Dr. Bree Cook. SUNOMA honored Dr. William Bertrand, Dr. Sara Hollis, and Ms. Vanessa DeCarbo for their contributions to the museum's success. The evening began with a moving performance by Djembafola, followed by a spiritual dance from stilt walkers. The celebration concluded with Sporty's Brass Band leading a jubilant procession, transforming grief into celebration in honor of Dr. DeCarbo's one-year transition.

On February 18th, the exhibition continued with *In Flow with the Spirit*, a memorial event held on the dock of the Natchez Steamboat. This deeply spiritual gathering, attended by Dr. DeCarbo's family and friends, honored African art and its creators. Chancellor Ammons, Director Witt, poet Sunni Patterson, and Reverend H. Scott Matheney offered reflections of comfort and remembrance. The memorial ended with a peaceful journey aboard the Steamboat Natchez, symbolizing the flow of spirit and heritage.
