CBA FACULTY PARTICIPATE IN HARVARD UNIVERSITY BUSINESS SCHOOL CONTINUING ED. PROGRAM

Dr. Samuel Eweni and Dr. Krishna Poudel from SUNO College of Business & Public Administration attended Harvard Business Publishing Education's Teaching with Cases Seminar at Harvard Business School from July 30 to August 1, 2025. The course was facilitated by Harvard professors and included remote case assignments utilizing ChatGPT before the on-campus session.

The seminar aimed to enhance faculty skills to foster critical thinking and decision-making in students. Additionally, Dr. Igwe Udeh and Dr. Yun Doo Lee participated in a similar seminar in July-August 2024.

RENEWABLE ENERGY MANAGMENT PROGRAM

The Renewable Energy Management (REM) program continues to grow in popularity across campus. Over the past three semesters, students from diverse disciplines—including Business Administration, Computer Information Systems, Public Administration, and the Natural Sciences—have increasingly enrolled in REM courses.
