

SUNO MILLIE M. CHARLES SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK HOSTED DR. DIXON CHIBANDA!



The SUNO Millie M Charles School of Social Work Grief and Trauma Center and the Community Healers Collaborative recently hosted Dr. Dixon Chibanda, founder and CEO of the Friendship Bench program, for a two-hour session.

Dr. Chibanda is recognized for his work in mental health, specifically his development of the Friendship Bench program in Zimbabwe. This program involves trained community grandmothers delivering talk therapy based on principles of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) from wooden park benches. In 2022 alone, over 100,000 people received therapy via this method.

During the session, Dr. Chibanda provided an in-depth explanation of the Friendship Bench program, detailing how it works, its success in Zimbabwe, and its potential for adaptation and implementation in other cultural and societal contexts. He emphasized the importance of integrating indigenous knowledge with western models of care, which forms the foundation of the Friendship Bench.

The faculty and staff showed keen interest in Dr. Chibanda's presentation, particularly in understanding how principles from the Friendship Bench program could be applied to further the work of the SUNO grief and trauma center. The discussion was interactive, with Dr. Chibanda responding to numerous questions, providing further insights into his work.

The event concluded with a discussion on potential collaboration efforts, with the idea of implementing a similar approach at the SUNO center being well-received. The visit by Dr. Chibanda provided valuable insights that could enhance the center's future work, making it a significant milestone for the SUNO Millie M Charles School of Social Work Grief and Trauma Center and the Community Healers Collaborative.

Dr. Illya Tietzel participated from July 18-27, 2023, in the "CRISPR-Cas9 in the Classroom Workshop 2023" at the University of Houston in Texas. This workshop was organized by the steering committee members Drs. Donna Pattison, Michael Wolyniak, Tiffany Hoage, Anil Challa, Dawn Carter, Jay Pieczynski, Latanya Hammonds-Odie, Maria Santisteban, Nicholas Ruppel, and Sara Olson. Participants received hands-on training and theoretical background to initiate and implement the modern DNA technology of CRISPR-Cas9 in the classroom as a lab technique.

The National Science Foundation funded the workshop, award RCN-UBE: Bringing CRISPR-Cas9 technologies to the undergraduate classroom: an undergraduate instructors' network.

Dr. Illya Tietzel was invited and accepted to serve as a Review Editor on the Editorial Board for Frontiers in Cellular and Infection Microbiology. Review editors review manuscripts submitted for publication. The journal has an impact factor of 5.7, and the publisher Frontiers was 2022, the third most cited publisher.

Dr. Illya Tietzel served in July 2023 as a visiting Scientist during the Healthy Mind Healthy Body summer camp at SUNO, which Dr. Celina Carson of the College of Education & Human Development is leading.

Dr. Tietzel introduces hands-on biology to different age groups. One group is elementary school kids; the other cohort is middle school kids.

Exciting updates for the launch of the Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity Program at Southern University New Orleans!

- SUNO has been accepted as a member of the Minority Serving Cyberinfrastructure Consortium (MS-CC), which will enable the university to secure funding for the cybersecurity program.
- SUNO has been formally accepted into the Cisco Networking Academy, joining only three other Cisco Academies in New Orleans Herzing, City of New Orleans, and Herzing University. Being an HBCU, SUNO receives free benefits for content with no additional costs.
- SUNO has also established a corporate social responsibility (CSR) education program partnership with Cisco, which provides free curriculum and tools to SUNO, including the learning platform, instructor development, student career resources, and more. The cybersecurity and IT courses are focused on career skills and include industry certifications. Theree are free career resources through the Talent Bridge program to match students and alumni to over 650 employers, internships for students, and courses aligned with industry certifications that employers seek.
